## Delaware is on the verge of a blue-collar

A career in construction is again a viable option for many Delawareans. Thanks to Governor John Carney's Construction Career Expo and several key state initiatives, we have the opportunity to see a resurgence in skilled trades' job opportunities.

It's important, and long overdue, to be able to say a career in construction can be an option for Delawareans. We remember fondly how Delaware communities like Newark, Claymont, Seaford, and Wilmington thrived with well-paying blue-collar job households.

These jobs offered families stability by offering individuals - most, if not all, without college degrees middle-class wages, health insurance and a pension. Plus, these jobs provided an extra benefit: wages stayed in the local community when families shopped locally, ate at local restaurants, and supported local businesses. Finally, it is impossible to overstate how these jobs offered a path to a career and an opportunity to a middle class lifestyle for several generations of families.

For a long time, talking about seeing a resurgence of sustained skilled trades and construction jobs was just talk. Today, blue collar job

opportunities are on the verge of returning to Delaware.

In the near future, we expect a growing demand in Delaware for skilled tradespeople in construction, industrial and commercial maintenance, and manufacturing. Again, this is due in large part to promotional efforts spearheaded by the Governor and two key initiatives approved by the General Assembly: approving the Port of Wilmington agreement with Gulftainer and modernizing the Coastal Zone Act.

Modernizing the Coastal Zone Act to enable the responsible rehabilitation of 14 parcels into productive use was an important step forward for the state. The job opportunities plus the potential overall economic stimulus for the state that these 14 parcels represent is significant. The sooner reasonable regulations that address environment concerns and that establish a reliable, timely process for businesses to invest in these parcels are completed, the sooner we will see more Delawareans working.

Additionally, the Port of Wilmington's future looks very bright, thanks to the State's agreement with Gulftainer. Gulftainer's expected investment, combined with their operational

expertise and the Port's location on the Delaware River, all point to a growing demand for skilled trades men and women to fill thousands of jobs.

To meet this expected demand, we must look to sustain and expand a critical component that fuels these blue collar jobs - an apprenticeship system that produces highly skilled, Delaware workers.

All trades within the Delaware **Building Trades proudly offer federal** or state certified apprenticeship programs in Delaware.

These apprentice programs are a proven method in which a person learns a construction trade by working alongside a journeyman an individual accreditation status nationally recognized certifying a well-rounded ability in all phases of their trade. Along with anywhere from 4,000 - 8,000 hours of on-the-job training, apprenticeships generally complete a minimum of 144 hours of classroom instruction in their field.

These programs have many short- and long-term benefits for apprentices. First, these programs are offered tuition-fre <u>Journal</u> on September 19, 2018.

second, apprentices work for an employer or sponsor and are paid while they learn their respective trade; and, finally, the apprentice graduates with the skills to have a life-long career.

It is critical to get information about the growing number of construction careers to middle and high schoolers and equally important to make sure students - and their parents understand the math and reading foundations necessary to enter apprentice programs. That is why we partnered with other organizations to host the Construction Career Expo and have expanded our outreach effort in Wilmington and throughout the state to inform residents and students about how to take advantage of these opportunities. Together, we look forward to

## Delaware State AFL-CIO, Building Trades and AFSCME Co-Sponsor Governor's Construction Expo

On September 21st and 22<sup>nd</sup>, at the Chase Center on the Riverfront, Governor John Carney along with the Delaware State AFL-CIO, Delaware Building Trades, AFSCME and other partner organizations hosted the first Governor's Construction Career Expo to expose Delaware students and Delawareans exploring a career change to careers in construction.

The construction industry is one of Delaware's fastest-growing employment sectors with more than 3,500 job openings expected through 2024. The Governor's Construction Career Expo introduced training and career paths to students and those looking to move from jobs to meaningful careers. This initiative was also an opportunity to connect employers and career-seekers, and to continue to train and develop a strong, skilled Delaware workforce.

"We're working hard to make sure that all Delawareans have the opportunity to succeed and share in our state's economic progress," said Governor Carney. "Careers in construction have provided paths into the

middle class for thousands of Delaware workers and their families. Those same opportunities exist today."

At the Expo on September 21<sup>st</sup>, nearly 2,000 middle school students from various schools in New Castle County had the opportunity to participate in one of three scheduled blocks to meet with employers, sample fun activities and tools, and participate in heavy equipment demonstrations and virtual simulators. This specialized field trip was coordinated with school principals and school districts.

On September 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Expo was opened to the community where exhibitors and more than 50 local employers shared information on how to acquire the skill sets needed to enter high-paying construction careers.

"We are excited to showcase the different construction trades and the growing opportunities for careers in Union construction," said James Maravelias, President of the Delaware Building and Construction Trades Council.

## Delaware State AFL-CIO Endorsed Candidates

At the Federal level, there are multiple anti-Union efforts underway from fighting efforts to weaken federal employees' union protection and easing their firing to managing the repercussions from the Supreme Court's decision in *Janus v. AFSCME*.

At the state level, despite defeating Sussex County's Right-To-Work ordinance and passing legislation to overturn Seaford's Right-To-Work ordinance, there is still a strong anti-Union agenda.

During the 2018 election season, members of the Delaware State AFL-CIO Executive Committee had the opportunity to discuss with candidates their rationale for seeking public office and their policy positions should they be successful this November.

Most importantly, the Committee focused exclusively on how a candidate's vision and policy positions aligned with the Organized Labor's objectives around critical issues such as Right-To-Work, collective bargaining, prevailing wage, and creating Union jobs.

### **GULFTAINER. DELAWARE SIGN PORT OF WILMINGTON LEASE**

#### Agreement expected to create jobs, generate as much as \$600 million in new investment

n September 18, Governor John Carney, the Diamond State Port Corporation, and GT USA Wilmington, LLC finalized an agreement that will significantly expand the Port of Wilmington, create jobs, and lead to as much as \$600 million of new investment at one of Delaware's most important industrial sites. Earlier this year, Governor Carney announced the agreement with Gulftainer to lease the Port of Wilmington from the State, construct a new container shipping facility on the Delaware River, and significantly expand jobs at the Port over the next decade.

"This historic agreement will result in significant new investment in the Port of Wilmington, which has long been one of Delaware's most important industrial job centers," said Governor Carney. "For decades, jobs at the Port have helped stabilize Delaware families and the communities where they live. I was proud to help make our partnership with Gulftainer official today, and I want to thank members of the General Assembly, the Diamond State Port Corporation, Gulftainer, the International Longshoremen's Association, and all of our partners

who have helped make this agreement a reality."

Under terms of the agreement finalized on Tuesday, Gulftainer's subsidiary GT USA Wilmington, LLC will make annual royalty payments to the State of Delaware reaching an estimated \$13 million over the next decade. The company plans to invest as much as \$600 million in the Port over the next decade, including approximately \$410 million for a new container facility at DuPont's former Edgemoor site, which was acquired by the Diamond State Port Corporation in 2016.

"This is a great day for the State of Delaware," said William Ashe,
President of International Longshoremen's Association Local 1694.

"We're strengthening the Port and local job creation. I was very happy
to be a part of this celebration and agreement signing today."

dependability in ports and logistics operations around the world, and will create thousands of new jobs, enhanced links and sustainable value for Wilmington and the State. We are confident that this public-private partnership will propel the Port of Wilmington towards becoming the principal gateway of the Eastern Seaboard."

"This is truly a remarkable partnership for the State of Delaware, the City of Wilmington, our Port and the thousands of families whose livelihoods depend on this facility,"

said Secretary of State Jeff Bullock, Chairman of the Diamond State Port Corporation. "The agreement signed today represents many months of very hard work on the part of many people, all of whom were dedicated to achieving a result that benefits all sides. It has been a privilege to be a part of this effort; I'm proud of the work we've done, and I'm excited for the future of this partnership and what it will mean for our state."
